The concept behind the appraisal was to find out how local people wanted to see the parish develop - or not develop - so that we are all in a better position to influence the changes in rural life which will inevitably face us over the next decade.

The clear and overwhelming conclusion is that residents want to see the parish remain essentially as it is - a working and retirement community in which village spirit and environment are the most highly valued features of daily life.

As chairman, I would like to thank all the members of the appraisal group for their tremendous dedication and effort throughout what has been a lengthy, but hopefully interesting and rewarding project. On their behalf, I would also like to record our grateful thanks to:

- Sevenhampton Parish Council for sponsoring the project and making a donation towards the cost.
- The Gloucestershire Rural Community Council particularly to Ros Leigh and Sally Bex for their help and advice.
- Gloucestershire Rural Action for their grant which has largely funded the project.

The Parish

D ackground

The Parish of Sevenhampton is situated some seven miles east of Cheltenham in Gloucestershire. Access is from the A436 Bourton - Andoversford road via Quarry Hill or via Syreford, which can be approached from the A40 at Whittington. Another route is from Winchcombe via Cotehay or Roel Gate. The parish is within the administrative area of Cotswold District Council.

The parish boundary extends from Salperton and Hampen to beyond Whitehall and encloses the villages of Sevenhampton and Brockhampton which lie in a valley created by the River Coln. In turn, the villages are divided into areas known as Upper and Lower Sevenhampton, and in Brockhampton, Quarry Hill, Brockhampton Park and Cotehay. Cotehay and part of Brockhampton Park area is outside the parish and falls within the administrative area of Tewkesbury Borough Council.

A sketch-map of the parish is shown on page 27 of this report. The overall population of the parish in August 1993 was 369.



In Brockhampton much of the development, particularly this century, took place due to the presence of Brockhampton Park, an estate complete with deer park, lodge properties and a lake created by damming the river. Houses were built for estate staff and the estate remained intact until disposals in 1934. The development of Sevenhampton was similarly influenced by the presence of the Whittington Estate.

Until recent times the parish enjoyed the usual facilities associated with a typical village including a school, a church and a vicarage located at Sevenhampton. Brockhampton had the Rhodes Memorial Hall and former Reading Room, the chapel, the Craven Arms public house and the post office and shop in Quarry Hill. However, the vicarage, the school and the chapel have all been lost to the community together with the recreation field at Brockhampton and the nursery garden at Brockhampton Park. Brockhampton Park itself is now residential, with outbuildings converted into housing, and the deer have long disappeared from the deer park.

Farming remains important, whilst at the edge of the parish, quarrying is undertaken and garden stoneware from reconstituted stone is produced in the former Woodside Garage on the A436. Other enterprises exist in various forms including horses at livery, building and construction, stone walling, consultancy and office work.

In a number of instances, old agricultural buildings have been converted into dwellings. Some new building has been undertaken in the traditional style but some has been more contemporary.


Within the parish there is a pleasant mix of gentle sloping fields with dry stone walling, small woodlands and newer plantings. There are many large trees of a specimen nature as well as managed shelter belts alongside the lanes. Such varied scenery is served by parish footpaths and bridleways enjoyed by visiting walkers and local residents alike.

Such is the appeal of the countryside and environment that much of it has been designated as a conservation area. Because of the natural topography which has dictated the positioning of the settlements, the parish does not have what is regarded as a typical village layout but has rather more scattered focal points of housing and development. Nonetheless, these very much come together and integrate as one community in which the parish identity and village spirit are very strong.

Drofile

123 households completed the questionnaire, representing nearly 300 people. The parish profile which emerges from these questionnaires is as follows:

- •the parish has almost the same number of males (143) and females(153)
- •about 50% of households are in Brockhampton, 25% in Sevenhampton and the remainder in outlying areas
- about 50% of the population are aged between 22 and 60
- there are about 50 children aged 16 or under
- there are about 80 people aged over 60 and of these 21 are over 75
- · about 72% of families have lived in the parish for over five years
- for nearly 90% of the population, their home in the parish is their only residence
- 54% are employed or self-employed and unemployment is significantly below the county average
- 22% are wholly retired and there are about 20 people in full-time education or training



Background to the Appraisal

Thy undertake an appraisal?

The concept of parish or village appraisals is not new and about 60 parishes in Gloucestershire have already undertaken such a project.

A parish appraisal is an opinion survey which seeks the views of villagers on the village and village life. At a time when there are many forces for change affecting rural communities, including pressures from legislation, central government, commercial practice and environmental lobby a parish appraisal provides an opportunity to take the pulse of village life.

Even since the project started a year or so ago, the parish has experienced change. There has been pastoral reorganisation, the sale of the vicarage, the induction of a priest-in-charge responsible for eight parishes, the demise of our local church magazine and a change in the location and management of the community post office.

An appraisal helps to establish the perceived values and priorities of local people with an eye to influencing the future direction of this inevitable process of change.

That can an appraisal achieve?

The potential benefits are significant but the actual benefits will depend very much on the action taken to implement the recommendations which emerge from the appraisal.

Appraisals

- encourage discussion of the parish by the parish
- provide an opportunity for the 'silent majority' to express their views
- establish a better understanding of local needs, attitudes and concerns
- become a basis for policy and action by the parish council and other community organisations

How was the Sevenhampton Parish appraisal organised? The parish council agreed to sponsor an appraisal and the concept was then put to a parish meeting held in the village hall in November 1995. This meeting positively endorsed the proposal and an appraisal group was formed to take responsibility for the project.

It was decided that this group should

- be representative of a good cross-section of the community, particularly in terms of area. sex, age and period of residence in the parish
- be seen to be independent of the parish council but include representation from it
- include representation from each of the principal village organisations

As a result, the following people have been working on the project for just over 12 months and have met on about 25 occasions.

Keith Gregory was also a member of this group but, due to illness, he was unable to continue.

One of the first tasks of the appraisal group was to establish clear aims and objectives for the project and these are shown below.

The group then had to design the questionnaire and organise its distribution and subsequent collection and return (see page 6). The data from the completed questionnaires was then input to a computer analysis program from which conclusions were drawn to form the basis of this report.

This report

The main recommendations of the appraisal group are shown on page 7. These seek to capture the key conclusions and to highlight the fact that the whole focus of the exercise was to establish areas for action.

The main body of the report is contained on pages 8 to 19 and represents a summary and an interpretation of the overall responses received. The full analysis of the completed questionnaires is included as an appendix so those who are interested can study the fine detail.

The next steps

The intention is to issue this report to every household within the parish. Copies will also be sent to the parish, district and county councils and to several external agencies for their information.

It will then be for the community to consider the conclusions and recommendations and to determine what new initiatives should be actioned and who will be responsible for them.

A further parish meeting will be held in March 1997 for this purpose.



The Aims of the Appraisal

The aims of the appraisal group were to

- carry out a survey of the views of all villagers to ascertain their needs, concerns and aspirations about the future development of the villages and village life
- provide the parish council and other community groups and organisations with an authoritative village mandate and a framework of policy and action to undertake initiatives which will be of general benefit to the community

The Questionnaire

T he appraisal is based upon the results of a questionnaire which was issued to every household within the parish during July 1996.

This questionnaire was developed using a computer program produced in 1991 by the Gloucestershire Rural Community Council specifically for village appraisals. Whilst the majority of the questions were prescribed in standard format by this program, the appraisal group was able to add a limited number of additional questions aimed specifically at local issues.

The questionnaire was in two parts:

Section 1 - The Household Section

This was designed to be completed by one adult on behalf of the whole household and sought statistical information about that household.

Section 2 - The Personal Section

This section invited information and opinions on a number of topics from each resident in the household over the age of 11.

istribution and response

The questionnaire was delivered personally to each household within the parish by a member of the appraisal group. A blank envelope was provided for the return of the questionnaire so that responses would be anonymous.

The parish was divided into six areas and the distribution and response was as follows:

Having regard to the fact that there were four empty properties, the maximum possible number of completed questionnaires was 145. The 119 completed questionnaires received represents 82% of that figure and is an excellent response from the community.

The appraisal group considered that the residents of that part of Brockhampton which is just outside the parish boundary are nonetheless very much part of the village. Therefore, nine further questionnaires were issued in this area, of which four were completed, and this increased the number of completed questionnaires to the total of 123 on which this report is based.

D eading the report

RWhen studying the information and comments in the report, it should be noted that:

- whilst an 82% response represents a very good cross-section of opinion, inevitably the views expressed do not represent the views of the total parish population
- unless stated otherwise, percentages refer to the percentage of respondents actually answering the question
- not all the 296 people represented by the 123 completed questionnaires answered every question
- some questions were in multiple-choice format and allowed for more than one answer

Main Recommendations for Action

The parish should stay essentially as it is but should

- develop leisure activities for the under 16s
- arrange evening classes and new social activity groups in the village hall
- retain the post office and promote its use
- acquire a recreation field as a project for the millennium
- organise a major annual charity event within the parish
- acquire a car park near the village hall
- publish a regular village magazine
- establish a good neighbour and voluntary car scheme
- request the parish council to provide more information about its activities, decisions and local planning applications



Housing

The parish has a stable population with 72% of families having lived here for over five years. Very few people are seeking alternative accommodation and there is no evidence of a major housing need.

No we need development?

- "... a need for some housing for the elderly but danger of development for development's sake .."
- "... a need for more affordable housing .."

About 20% see no need for new housing in the parish and do not regard any development as acceptable. However, there is support for housing for

- young people

- the elderly

About 45% see a need for housing for local people and for rented accommodation.

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
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W/hat type of development?

The most acceptable local development is the conversion of redundant buildings and infilling, but there is some support for extensions to smaller properties.

-Recommendation

The parish council should: ADVISE COTSWOLD DISTRICT COUNCIL OF THESE CONCLUSIONS AND TAKE ACCOUNT OF THEM IN DECIDING LOCAL HOUSING PRIORITIES



Employment

The current profile

54% are employed or self employed and unemployment is below the county average of 4.8% (October 1996).
About 35 people work from home or from elsewhere in the parish and a further 65 people or so work within 10 miles of the villages.

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- about 50 people are wholly retired
- about 20 people are in full-time education or training
- about 30 people are unwaged housepersons.

W/hat about the future?

... the village should continue to blend as a working and retirement and caring community.."

Nearly 40 people are likely to be seeking work within the next five years and about half of these want work in the service industries.

- most of those seeking work wish to be employed locally and require information on local job vacancies
- there are about 20 employers within the parish and they expect their workforce to remain at present levels or marginally increase over the next five years

Recommendation

LOCAL JOB VACANCIES SHOULD BE DISPLAYED ON A NOTICE BOARD IN THE POST OFFICE

Education

As there is no school within the parish, the focus of the questionnaire was on adult education and evening classes.

- nearly 140 people expressed interest in attending evening classes if these were organised in the parish
- on average, each individual indicated an interest in two activities and there was a significant response for:

crafts

languages

arts

- information technology
- sports

Other interests include keep fit and music.

Recommendation

The village hall management committee should: CONSIDER ARRANGING EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITY GROUPS IN THE VILLAGE HALL

Local Countryside and Environment

Footpaths and Bridleways

89% are able to follow local footpaths and bridleways without much difficulty, but there were comments that


- there is a need for more signs on Cleeve Common and between Charlton Abbotts and Brockhampton
- some stiles are difficult for the elderly and gates would be an improvement

Disturbance

Over 40% are concerned by the disturbance or nuisance caused by

- low-flying aircraft
- heavy traffic
- dog fouling

Approximately 30 people expressed concern about hunting and about litter



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The Landscape

"The village is unique and rather special in many ways - it is a fragile balance and care should be taken not to spoil what is excellent in pursuit of the modern...."

There is very strong support to protect a number of existing features of the parish

- over 80% highlighted the church and the village hall
- over 70% highlighted Sevenhampton splash, the Walks, Gassons Lane, the village greens and the telephones
- over 50% highlighted the Craven Arms and Campden Lane.

Mention was also made of the Old Brewery chimney, the Arrow Shed, the Deer Park, the tap recesses and Cotswold stone walling throughout the parish.

When asked which areas of the parish could be improved visually

- 35 people cited the rickyard and the Arrow Shed in Brockhampton
- several people mentioned the footpaths and banks of the River Coln at Donneywell and Sevenhampton

"...it is important to appreciate and conserve our environment.."

D efuse Collection

N 221 people (92%) are prepared to support a segregated refuse recycling scheme

Recommendation

The parish council should:

•NOTIFY THE MINISTRY OF DEFENCE OF THE CONCERN ABOUT LOW FLYING AIRCRAFT

• ADVISE THE DOG WARDEN AT THE DISTRICT COUNCIL OF THE PROBLEM OF DOG FOULING

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Health and Social Services

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Ts there difficulty in accessing medical services?

Over 52% are registered with a doctor in Charlton Kings. Practices in Northleach and Winchcombe are also used.

About 90% say they never have difficulty in getting to the hospital, doctor, dentist, chemist, or optician but

- a small number often have a problem with all the services

 about 15 or so occasionally experience a problem getting to the hospital, the doctor or the chemist

140 people think it necessary to have a weekly doctor's surgery in the parish and these reflect most age groups. On the other hand, about 70 people think such a surgery is unnecessary.

No special health needs were identified which could be catered for in the parish.

Chould there be a formalised good neighbour scheme?

"... village life should be slower, quieter, more friendly and caring because people have time to meet and chat.."

"... be more venturesome and innovative and ... be more caring for the elderly .."

Over 50 people are prepared to become involved at least once a month in the operation of a good neighbour scheme (for example, shopping or car transport) and a further 90 say they would be prepared to help occasionally.

Recommendation

The parish council should :

EXPLORE THE POSSIBILITY OF A WEEKLY DOCTOR'S SURGERY IN THE VILLAGE HALL

The Sevenhampton and District Women's Institute (or other group) should:

CONSIDER ORGANISING A FORMALISED GOOD NEIGHBOUR AND VOLUNTARY CAR SCHEME



Policing and Security

Nearly 50% did not have an opinion on the service provided by the local police officer. Of those who did express an opinion

- over 60% consider the service to be poor
- and only 5% think it is good

Teighbourhood Watch

There is very strong support (82%) for the continuation of the existing Neighbourhood Watch scheme and some 70 people are prepared to take a more active part in the operation of the scheme.

Recommendation

The neighbourhood watch scheme organisers should: HOLD A PARISH MEETING TO CAPTURE NEW INTEREST

Retail Services and Other Facilities

Tow often is the post office used?

"... retain the post office .. "

About 150 people use the Brockhampton post office at least once a month and 50 or so at least once a week, but another 90 never use it at all.

- the majority use is for postal services, the collection of pensions and allowances and the payment of TV licences and other bills
- those who do not use it appear to use Andoversford or another main post office facility
 - * The Post office has now been relocated to the Rhodes Memorial Hall

W/hat is the view about doorstep deliveries?

There is very strong support for these existing doorstep deliveries to continue

- milkman (90%)
- daily papers (85%)
- baker (60%)


There is also significant support for the fishmonger and for a butcher (17%) but there is no significant demand for other new services.

Recommendation

The parish council should:

SUPPORT THE RETENTION OF THE POST OFFICE IN THE PARISH



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Sport, Social and Entertainment

What are the existing activities and facilities?

✓ There is a perception that some of the existing leisure activities are not sufficiently publicised.

O we need a playing field?

"... we desperately need a plot of land where youngsters can kick a football in security .."

"... I would like to see in the very near future some kind of play area for the children ...Brockhampton is a beautiful village to me but I wish my children didn't feel the need to leave the village to have some fun.."

144 people (60%) consider the parish needs a recreation field and of these 120 are adults.

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
"... it would be excellent to have a project associated with the millennium .."


H^{ow} good are facilities for younger age groups? "...young people are the future of the village .. need to organise events so that they become part of village life.."

Existing leisure facilities for the under 16s are generally considered 0102030405060708090100 to be poor (56%) and the same view is expressed about existing facilities for the 17 to 25 age group (46%).

This contrasts with the view that existing leisure facilities for the over 25s and over 65s are either good or reasonable (60%).

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Simon Oldham aged 12

s there support for new activities in the village?

There is significant support for new social activity groups to be formed.

- about 40 would like to see the formation of a gardeners society, a rambling club, a youth club and a painting and drawing group
- groups such as a music or choral society, a photography group, a table tennis club and a literature group would each attract the support of between 25 and 30 people
- mention was also made of whist drives

Over 40 people say they would be prepared to organise some of these activities.

The village hall

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65 people say that they use the village hall at least once a month and about another 120 use it less frequently.

Over 75% think that the village hall is adequate for the needs of the parish.

Where improvements were suggested, they included more accommodation, more storage, better kitchen facilities and the provision of a car park.

hould the parish hold an annual charity event?

115 people (56%) think that the village should organise a major annual charity event but 44% are not in favour.

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Recommendation

The parish council should:



Transport and Highways



s there a problem getting in or out of the parish?

75 % have no transport difficulty getting in or out of the parish but about 60 people do have a problem on occasions.

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There are 40 volunteers with cars who are prepared to help provide a voluntary transport service and this is consistent with the response to a good neighbour scheme.

About 60 people would use a locally-based car service at least occasionally. The strong preference is for a locally based taxi service

s there a car parking problem?

About 140 people say that they sometimes have a car parking problem near to where they live. Of these, 40 or so often have this problem and they identify the main trouble spots as

- the area near the village hall
- the road to the Craven Arms
- near the church
- Quarry Hill

Opinion is closely divided as to whether the parish needs a car park but

- 109 people (the majority) are in favour
- over 100 people consider that an area near the village hall is the best place to site it
- about 40 people think it should be sited near the church

LT ow important is the bus service?

I Most people do not use the bus service.

However, of those who expressed an opinion, 66% (85 people) view it as either important or essential.

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There were few adverse comments about either cost or reliability but

- 50 or so people would like to see improvements to the timetable
- 20 or so people would like to see improvements to the route

R oad safety

60% think that the maintenance of local road surfaces, hedges and verges is either good or reasonable in terms of road safety, but there is significant criticism of the road surfaces near Palmerstone Quarry.

64% think that there are some major danger spots within the parish and the following were particularly mentioned

- Quarry Hill
- Brockhampton Park crossroads
- access to and from Gassons Lane
- the junctions of Church Lane and Webbs Lane with the Winchcombe road

Road signs in the parish are generally considered adequate for safety (60%) but there are some suggestions for improvement which include

- more 'Slow' and 'Narrow Road' signs
- 'Access Only' to Gassons Lane.

oes the parish need street lighting?

150 people (65%) are strongly opposed to street lighting anywhere in the parish but there is significant support (70 people) for this to be introduced in a few strategic areas such as


- the area between the village green and the village hall in Brockhampton
- the road to the Craven Arms





Information and Communication

ibrary Services

There is only 22% support for a permanent library service, but

- 50 or so people use the existing fortnightly mobile service on occasions and of these, 30 or so use it on nearly every visit
- those who do use this service generally consider the siting of the stops is good

nformation about what is going on in the parish

80% consider that the information is at least reasonable and 25% think that it is good

Nearly 90% look at a notice board at least once a month

) o we need a regular parish magazine?

"... a regular newsletter or magazine would be useful in outlying areas especially ... "

Over 200 people read the 'Foursome' and the village hall 'Newsletter' and most of these read them regularly.

- 62% think the parish requires a regular newsletter or magazine
- 50 or so people say that they are prepared to help with such a publication

re the telephone kiosks important?

Withdrawal of the telephone kiosks would create a problem for about 90 people.

Recommendation

The village hall management committee should:



Religion

The overwhelming view is that the church is important to the parish.

It is valued as an historic building and as a focal point for village life as well as for worship and prayer.

There might be additional support for Sunday worship and family services if these were held at different times or in a different format.



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Local Government

The Parish Council

- 50% say that the parish council is poor in the way in which it publicises its decisions and activities
 - 75% would like more information about the activities of the parish council
 - 70% think that the parish council satisfies their needs and expectations either very well or reasonably well

The District and County Councils

- 60% think that the district council performs at least reasonably well and
 - 46% have the same view about the county council

The community charge

Of those who expressed an opinion, the majority (56%) say that they would be prepared to pay a slightly higher 0102030 parish community charge to meet some of the needs identified by this appraisal.

ocal planning control

"... very important that the characteristics of a Cotswold village should be the primary consideration in all development and planning.."

54% think that insufficient publicity is given to planning applications affecting the parish.

In relation to planning control on development within the parish, there is no significant concern over new housing or conversions but 20% expressed concern over the design and location of agricultural buildings.

Recommendation

The parish council should: REVIEW AND IMPROVE THE WAY IT PUBLICISES ITS ACTIVITIES, DECISIONS AND LOCAL PLANNING APPLICATIONS


